

The Board's commitment to public safety extends, as well, to the needs of the Police Department and the increasing calls for service burdening our officers. Several years ago, the Board set forth on a plan which would increase the staffing of the Department to 30 sworn officers. Recently, the 30th officer was added and we welcome Carly Parker to our police family. This new staffing level allows for a restructuring of the command staff, on-street platoons, and in-house detective unit which can now focus more diligently on fighting increasing crime, drug abuse, and domestic issues which are becoming more commonplace not only in Limerick, but nationwide as well. I congratulate Lieutenant Robert Matalavage, Sergeants Patrick Roche and Brian Tyler, along with Corporals Stephen DeAngelis, Stephen Winneberger, and Shawn Pancoast on their recent promotions. All have served Limerick for many years and we look forward to the success they will achieve in their new positions and contributions they will provide to this community in the future.

With a police force now standing at 30 officers, the Board also recognized that the existing Township Police facility, originally built in 1973 to house a force of under 10 officers, could not sustain a modern department. The construction of a new police and municipal complex also began this year and we anticipate completion in the summer of 2018. This facility, designed to accommodate the force for the next 30 years, is part of a broad-based capital improvement plan focused on the core services provided by the Township which include Police, Public Works, Parks and Recreation, and Fire and Emergency responders. All Limerick taxpayers should be assured that the Board recognized the burden these programs could place on the tax base, but have enacted a long term funding strategy which will look to maintain real estate tax rates in the lower half of all Montgomery County communities. The Board stands committed not only to providing the highest level of services, but also to maintaining low real estate tax rates, which have been a mainstay of Limerick for well over a decade.

Additionally, I would be remiss if I did not recognize the contributions of Supervisor Joe St. Pedro who will be leaving the Board at the end of this year. The success that Limerick has achieved over the past several years would not have been possible without him. We thank Joe for his service and dedication to Limerick and wish him and his family well in all their future plans.

On behalf of the Board of Supervisors, I wish everyone a Merry Christmas, Happy New Year, and a wonderful Holiday Season.



New Police Command and Platoon Structure

Over the past several years, and in response to growing calls for police services, the Board set forth on a systematic approach to increase the Department to 30 sworn officers. Limerick is not immune to the rising crime, drug abuse, and domestic issues impacting the state and nation. To ensure that Limerick has the highest level of police protective services, long term planning was implemented to understand not only the optimal size of the department, but also the cost of a facility to accommodate a modern police force.

In 2017, the hiring process was completed providing the department with 30 sworn officers and the following organizational structure was implemented increasing patrols and detective services, and strengthening the command staff.

Detective Morris Honored for 20 Years of Service

On October 3, 2017, Detective Ernie Morris was honored by the Board of Supervisors for his 20 years of service with the Limerick Township Police Department. During Detective Morris's years of service, he has volunteered his time with the Montgomery County Camp Cadet programs, has been a longstanding member of the Montgomery County Drug Task Force, and in 2014 was sworn in as a task force officer with the Department of Homeland Security. He is the recipient of numerous commendations and we are fortunate to have him as part of our force.

Township Construction News

Construction of a new police and municipal facility began in March of this year. Completion is anticipated for the summer of 2018 and will accommodate the Police and all Township Municipal functions for the next 30-plus years. With an original Police building constructed in 1973 to house a force under 10 officers, construction studies revealed that the costs of new construction would offer a savings to the community of over 10% versus the cost of renovating the existing facility.

Joe St. Pedro is retiring from his position on the Limerick Board of Supervisors at the end of this year. Joe has served from January 2010 and during his tenure, has offered his time and talents toward many positive programs which will provide long term benefits to the community. During his tenure of 8 years, the Township has continuously held real estate tax rates below the average of all Montgomery County communities. Limerick was successful in purchasing the 17-acre Linfield Sports Park without the need for a tax increase and also saw the dedication to the Township of 24-acres which adjoin the Limerick Community Park. During his term, approximately \$1.5 million dollars of trail construction grant monies were received along with a \$2.1 million dollar grant for the construction of new ramps at the U.S. Route 422/Sanatoga interchange. Most importantly, Joe utilized his financial acumen to assist the Township in achieving an AAA Bond Rating with Standard and Poor's credit rating agency. Joe also served on the Township's Pension Committee and led the effort to stabilize and strengthen all pension accounts, which were negatively affected by the economic downturn of 2008.



Winter Reminders

- Do not drive unless it is absolutely necessary. If a state of emergency is called, please stay off the roads so the plows can do their job without any more danger.
- Keep winter driving aids (blanket, shovel, boots, etc.) in the trunk of your car.
- Remove snow, ice, and slush from sidewalks, including handicap ramps, within 24 hours after the snow has stopped falling.
- Plowing operations begin after more than 2" accumulation and freezing temperatures, which indicate no natural melting will occur.
- Clear vehicle completely of snow and ice before driving.
- Pile snow from sidewalks and driveways on lawns, not in the street.
- Residents are responsible for clearing snow around mailboxes.
- Basketball hoops are *not permitted* to be located within the right-of-way and *must be removed* from the roadway.
- Private plowing crews should haul snow from properties if it cannot be piled safely.
- Do *not* push snow onto the street or onto neighboring properties.
- Clear fire hydrants of snow as soon as possible.
- As the storm begins to come to an end. Plow units are pushing open all roads curb to curb which is to allow for another storm, please refrain from completely clearing your driveway until that truck makes its last pass due to the fact that it will be plowed over.
